Reflection on Psalm 120





The Faith of Abraham

God's people have always
felt like and
lived like
strangers on a journey
through a foreign land.
We can learn so much through the examples of these
brothers and sisters who have
gone before us.

Consider Abraham. (Genesis 11:27 – 25:10) He was heir to some of the most spectacular promises ever made to a human being:

God promised to make him a great nation – in fact, a multitude of nations; yet Abraham didn't have a single heir until age 100.

God promised to bless him and make his name great;

yet most of his life Abraham bore the curse of childlessness.

God promised Abraham's descendants the land of Canaan yet Abraham lived his entire life as a wanderer, never owning any land but a burial plot.

And his descendants would only inherit the land after 400 years of slavery.

Our essential connection with our great, unseen God is great faith,

and great faith seems to develop only through great testing.

Abraham, the father of all who are saved by faith, was one of history's most blessed persons and one of the most severely tested.

The demands made by faith are not easy, but they are amazingly simple:

God only asks us

to believe that He is

all He says He is,

all He has shown Himself to be, and

to live accordingly.

And He always only asks that we take

one single step of faith at a time.

As we do, faith grows,

step by step, need by need, day by day.









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Hebrews 11:1-31

(NASB)

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. For by it the men of old gained approval.

By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things which are visible.

By faith Abel offered to God a better sacrifice than Cain, through which he obtained the testimony that he was righteous, God testifying about his gifts, and through faith, though he is dead, he still speaks.

By faith Enoch was taken up so that he would not see death; and he was not found because God took him up; for he obtained the witness that before his being taken up he was pleasing to God.

And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him.

By faith Noah, being warned by God about things not yet seen, in reverence prepared an ark for the salvation of his household, by which he condemned the world, and became an heir of the righteousness which is according to faith.

By faith Abraham, when he was called, obeyed by going out to a place which he was to receive for an inheritance; and he went out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he lived as an alien in the land of promise, as in a foreign land, dwelling in tents with Isaac and Jacob, fellow heirs of the same promise; for he was looking for the city which has foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

By faith even Sarah herself received ability to conceive, even beyond the proper time of life, since she considered Him faithful who had promised. Therefore there was born even of one man, and him as good as dead at that, as many descendants as the stars of heaven in number, and innumerable as the sand which is by the seashore.

All these died in faith, without receiving the promises, but having seen them and having welcomed them from a distance, and having confessed that they were strangers and exiles on the earth. For those who say such things make it clear that they are seeking a country of their own. And indeed if they had been thinking of that country from which they went out, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; for He has prepared a city for them.

By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac, and he who had received the promises was offering up his only begotten son; it was he to whom it was said, "In Isaac your descendants shall be called." He considered that God is able to raise people even from the dead, from which he also received him back as a type.

By faith Isaac blessed Jacob and Esau, even regarding things to come.

By faith Jacob, as he was dying, blessed each of the sons of Joseph, and worshiped, leaning on the top of his staff.

By faith Joseph, when he was dying, made mention of the exodus of the sons of Israel, and gave orders concerning his bones.

By faith Moses, when he was born, was hidden for three months by his parents, because they saw he was a beautiful child; and they were not afraid of the king's edict. By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to endure ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin, considering the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt; for he was looking to the reward.

By faith he left Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king; for he endured, as seeing Him who is unseen. By faith he kept the Passover and the sprinkling of the blood, so that he who destroyed the firstborn would not touch them. By faith they passed through the Red Sea as though they were passing through dry land; and the Egyptians, when they attempted it, were drowned.

By faith the walls of Jericho fell down after they had been encircled for seven days.

By faith Rahab the harlot did not perish along with those who were disobedient, after she had welcomed the spies in peace.

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Reflection on the Book of Exodus

Question: Why would God send His people out

for forty years into a a dry, barren land that

lacked provision for even the necessities of life?

Answer: He didn't send them out.

He led them out.

He went with them and

before them.

Why did He led them into such places?

He humbled you and let you be hungry, and fed you with manna which you did not know, nor did your fathers know, that He might make you understand that man does not live by bread alone, but by everything that proceeds out of the mouth of the Lord (Deuteronomy 8:3, NASB).

God let them feel each need.

then waited for them to turn to Him before He graciously, miraculously, abundantly met each need.

So don't be surprised when He allows you to feel your need, then waits for you to wait on Him and trust Him.

He is not being

stubborn or

unfeeling.

He is giving you what you

need most

in all the world:

the firm, personal assurance,

based on repeated, first-hand experience, that

Triumphant through Suffering

Judges 4 – 8; 11 – 16

And what more shall I say? For time will fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets, who by faith conquered kingdoms, performed acts of righteousness, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions, quenched the power of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, from weakness were made strong, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight.

Women received back their dead by resurrection; and others were tortured, not accepting their release, so that they might obtain a better resurrection; and others experienced mocking and scourging, yes, also chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in two, they were tempted, they were put to death with the sword; they went about in sheepskins, in goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, ill-treated (men of whom the world was not worthy), wandering in deserts and mountains and caves and holes in the ground. (Hebrews 11:32-38, NASB)

Hebrews 11:1-31 told us of the faith of Noah, Abraham, Moses, and others. They trusted God in spite of great difficulties. Because they did, they pleased God, and He gave them the honor of participating in His marvelous plan of salvation.

But the list is not complete—not by any means. There's not enough time to tell of all those who by faith were victorious over opposition and suffering. The judges, the godly kings from David on, the prophets—the list is too long to recount. Verses 33-35a give us an inspiring summary of just a few of their amazing feats.

Then in the middle of v.35, the writer turns a corner. He now begins a brief summary of some of the brutality to which these heroes were subjected. The suffering ranges from ill-treatment to a truly horrifying death. He says that at least one was *sawn in two*! Why are these sufferings detailed like this?

The writer is not mourning the misfortune of these heroes. He is celebrating their victories!

The sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that is to be revealed to us. (Romans 8:18, NASB)

All these sufferings, long past, are now battles won for which they are enjoying rich, eternal rewards. These hardships are proofs of their faith and testimonies to God's faithfulness.

Momentary, light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory far beyond all comparison. (2 Corinthians 4:17, NASB)


Don't feel sorry for them. And don't feel sorry for yourself when unjust suffering comes to you.





Make this paraphrase of Philippians 3:12-14 your prayer:


"I have not yet obtained all God has for me.

Father, help me to lift my eyes above today's ups and downs and see You, my God, my Eternal Confidence, my Very Great Reward!



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

"Remember the word that I said to you, 'A slave is not greater than his master.' If they persecuted Me, they will also persecute you; if they kept My word, they will keep yours also. But all these things they will do to you for My name's sake, because they do not know the One who sent Me. If I had not come and spoken to them, they would not have sin, but now they have no excuse for their sin.

He who hates Me hates My Father also. If I had not done among them the works which no one else did, they would not have sin; but now they have both seen and hated Me and My Father as well. But they have done this to fulfill the word that is written in their Law, 'They hated Me without a cause.'" (John 15:18-25, NASB)

We hear no smooth-talking persuasion from Jesus. He describes the path ahead of us clearly and plainly: "Whoever wants to be my disciple

"Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." (Mark 8:34, NIV)

I want to finally lay down


this perpetual burden of petty self-concern.


I want to pick up my cross and go with Him wherever He goes. I am held captive by the magnificence of Jesus Christ.


