Ferocious Love

Transcendent Father, unseen God, You longed for us to know You. You let us touch You with our senses in creation and at Mt. Sinai. through the tabernacle and through Your prophets. But all the while You promised to share Yourself fully through a person who was to come, a man filled with Your own Spirit. This specially Anointed One, this Messiah, would live among us and rule over us. His Kingdom would extend through every nation and through all time. He would bring all the blessings You had ever promised. As the centuries passed, Your promises of this Messiah became increasingly detailed and vivid. We longed for His coming. But instead, He arrived as the weakest and lowliest of all human creatures a helpless infant born of an unmarried peasant girl. He wasn't a king not what we considered a king.

There wasn't anything regal about Him.

He was a rural laborer with an accent to match. He wasn't a mighty warrior.

He was a gentle healer,

a teacher with little formal education.

He didn't live in a palace.

He was a homeless wanderer.

His holiness wasn't fearful or awe-inspiring.

He befriended sinners, whom respectable people avoided.

He socialized with them and received them warmly.

The only people He condemned were

the ones we considered the most religious.

He scolded them for their pride and hypocrisy.

This Messiah didn't prowl and roar like a lion.

In the end, He died like a lamb, meek, silent, and defenseless.

He gave us a living picture of You,

but You were not who we expected.

We expected to experience Your

fiery,

ferocious,

all-conquering power.

fiery,



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Grace and Truth

John 1:14-18; Exodus 19; 32:18 – 34:8

The Word became flesh, and dwelt among us, and we saw His glory, glory as of the only begotten from the Father, full of grace and truth.

Of His fullness we have all received, and grace upon grace. For the Law was given through Moses; grace and truth were realized through Jesus Christ. No one has seen God at any time; the only begotten God who is in the bosom of the Father, He has explained Him. (John 1:14, 16-18, NASB)

Moses had been given

a more complete revelation of God than any person ever had. At Sinai he had experienced Almighty God with his physical senses through lightning and thunder. a thick cloud, earthquake, smoke, and fire. He had heard God's voice and had spoken with Him. But when Moses asked to see more of God's glory, to know more fully God's greatness and presence, how did God reveal Himself? He showed Himself as grace and truth: unfailing love and absolute dependability. When we look at Jesus the Son and His human life among us, what do we see?

Grace and truth:

unfailing love and absolute dependability.

Jesus is

always good, always compassionate, always gracious. His mercy is never strained. It never gets tired. It is never pushed too far. Even as they tortured and killed Jesus, He forgave them.

Jesus is truth. Every word is true. Every action is true. We can absolutely depend on everything He is, everything He says, and everything He does.

Jesus is the Son of the Father: unfailing love and absolute dependability.

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Matthew 2:12-18 (NASB)

Having been warned by God in a dream not to return to Herod, the magi left for their own country by another way.

Now when they had gone, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up! Take the Child and His mother and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is going to search for the Child to destroy Him."

So Joseph got up and took the Child and His mother while it was still night, and left for Egypt. He remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: "Out of Egypt I called My Son."

Then when Herod saw that he had been tricked by the magi, he became very enraged, and sent and slew all the male children who were in Bethlehem and all its vicinity, from two years old and under, according to the time which he had determined from the magi. Then what had been spoken through Jeremiah the prophet was fulfilled:

"A voice was heard in Ramah, Weeping and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children; And she refused to be comforted, Because they were no more."

When Messiah came, we expected a show of power. Instead He showed us the power of love.






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
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
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Scriptures about God's Love for the Lost

Matthew 9:36

Seeing the people, [Jesus] felt compassion for them, because they were distressed and dispirited like sheep without a shepherd.

Luke 15:1-10

Now all the tax collectors and the sinners were coming near Him to listen to Him. Both the Pharisees and the scribes began to grumble, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them."

So He told them this parable, saying, "What man among you, if he has a hundred sheep and has lost one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the open pasture and go after the one which is lost until he finds it? When he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and his neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost!' I tell you that in the same way, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance.

"Or what woman, if she has ten silver coins and loses one coin, does not light a lamp and sweep the house and search carefully until she finds it? When she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbors, saying, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin which I had lost!' In the same way, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

God Loves the Lost


Matthew 9:36; 10:5-6; 12:11-12; 15:24; 18:12-14; Mark 6:34; Luke 15; John 10:1-30; 2 Peter 3:9

Jesus doesn't think of sinners as repulsive people to be avoided despised, or condemned. He thinks of them as lost sheep, lost treasure, or lost children. They are to be searched for eagerly, lovingly, single-mindedly. God's love never gives up! Sinners arouse, not His condemnation, but His compassion. They stir, not His anger, but His love and mercy When the lost sheep is brought safely back, rejoice! When the treasure is found, celebrate! When the wayward child comes back home, still in the rags of sin, run to meet him! Shower him with hugs and joyful tears! Welcome him with full and glad acceptance! One of God's children is alive from the dead! Let the party begin!

Based on Hosea 11:1-11


My Dear Child,

Since before you were born, I've loved you. You were my delight, my pride and joy. I would sit and watch you and smile and laugh. I looked forward to being with you. I enjoyed you so much! I just could not do enough for you. I cared for you day and night. You were always on my mind and on my heart. When you were sick, I felt your pain and nursed you back to health. When you fell, I would lift you in my arms and hug you and gently kiss you. But the more I loved you, the more you resisted my love. The more I cared for you, the more you resented me. The more I did for you, the less you trusted me. I taught you to walk, and you chose to walk away from me. I shaped your young mind. I carefully fed it and nurtured it. But you became proud, and in your youthful ignorance you found me foolish and old-fashioned.

You took everything I gave you and turned it against me. But still I loved you and did all I could to help you. I saw trouble coming. I tried to warn you sometimes gently, sometimes in desperation, as shouting to one standing in front of an oncoming truck: "Look out! Get out of the way!" But you took my warnings as intrusions, as selfish attempts to "run your life." The trouble came the incredible hurt, the destruction, the shattered relationships. Believe me. being right brought me no joy. I suffered it all with you. I still see trouble coming. But I can't help you... not unless you let me... not unless you help yourself. A parent's grief for a lost child has no comfort, no consolation. except one. It is hope hope that the child will somehow just come back. Come back, child. Please. come back. Love forever,

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Luke 15:11-32 (NASB)

[Jesus] said, "A man had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the estate that falls to me.' So he divided his wealth between them.

And not many days later, the younger son gathered everything together and went on a journey into a distant country, and there he squandered his estate with loose living. Now when he had spent everything, a severe famine occurred in that country, and he began to be impoverished. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, and he sent him into his fields to feed swine. And he would have gladly filled his stomach with the pods that the swine were eating, and no one was giving anything to him.

But when he came to his senses, he said, 'How many of my father's hired men have more than enough bread, but I am dying here with hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven, and in your sight; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me as one of your hired men."

So he got up and came to his father. But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and felt compassion for him, and ran and embraced him and kissed him. And the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and in your sight; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly bring out the best robe and put it on him, and put a ring on his hand and sandals on his feet; and bring the fattened calf, kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found.' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his older son was in the field, and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. And he summoned one of the servants and began inquiring what these things could be. And he said to him, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fattened calf because he has received him back safe and sound.'

But he became angry and was not willing to go in; and his father came out and began pleading with him. But he answered and said to his father, 'Look! For so many years I have been serving you and I have never neglected a command of yours; and yet you have never given me a young goat, so that I might celebrate with my friends; but when this son of yours came, who has devoured your wealth with prostitutes, you killed the fattened calf for him.'

And he said to him, 'Son, you have always been with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, for this brother of yours was dead and has begun to live, and was lost and has been found.'"

Love Is Not Blind

Matthew 21:33-44

[Jesus said,] "Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard and put a wall around it and dug a wine press in it, and built a tower, and rented it out to vine-growers and went on a journey.

When the harvest time approached, he sent his slaves to the vine-growers to receive his produce. The vine-growers took his slaves and beat one, and killed another, and stoned a third. Again he sent another group of slaves larger than the first; and they did the same thing to them.

But afterward he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' But when the vine-growers saw the son, they said among themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and seize his inheritance.' They took him, and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him.

Therefore when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those vinegrowers?" They said to Him, "He will bring those wretches to a wretched end, and will rent out the vineyard to other vine-growers who will pay him the proceeds at the proper seasons."

Jesus said to them, "Did you never read in the Scriptures,

'The stone which the builders rejected, This became the chief corner stone; This came about from the Lord, And it is marvelous in our eyes'?

Therefore I say to you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people, producing the fruit of it. And he who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; but on whomever it falls, it will scatter him like dust."

And not only this, but we also exult in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received the reconciliation.

A Father's Love

When I was all wrong, inside and out...when I was so blind I didn't want to change...when I was so helpless I could not change, Jesus took responsibility for me. He took it upon himself to save me from my own sin and the death He knew it would bring me.

When that meant sacrifice, He was there. When it meant incredible suffering, He was there. When it meant submitting himself to abuse, humiliation, and death, He was there for me.

Because I was blind, proud, and completely helpless, He carried me and all my guilt on His back. He died for my sins so that I wouldn't have to.

If my wife or children were in danger, I'd do anything to save them. No matter what the threat or the cost, I'd be there. I'd gladly step into the gap for them. That's the way Jesus felt about me when I was far away from Him, when I didn't know Him and didn't care.

Jesus' life wasn't taken from Him. He laid it down willingly, and the Bible accounts bear that out. He knew ahead of time all the suffering that awaited Him, but He faced it anyway.

- He was betrayed by a close friend.
- He let himself be taken by those who hated Him and were eager to kill Him.
- He went through an illegal trial and was falsely accused, yet He never tried to defend himself.
- He was severely beaten and had a crown of thorns pressed onto His head.
- He was mocked and publicly humiliated. He watched and listened as the people He loved screamed for His execution.
- Finally, He was nailed to a wooden cross and hung there to die slowly while His enemies jeered and His mother watched and wept.

Jesus knows love. He knows how much it costs. He knows how much it can hurt. Nothing can break our hearts like our children when they turn away from us, trample our love, and slowly destroy themselves in the process. Jesus lived out a parent's perfect love.

Every day, through every word and action, He showed us our Father's heart toward us. And He showed it most eloquently, most poignantly, most completely in His death.

We look around at creation and see our Father's lavish love and care for us. But creation flows from the unmeasured abundance of His riches. Though the universe is so vast and varied, the Creator is undiminished by giving it.

But in Jesus, we see the Creator's love more fully. We see Him pouring himself out completely, unreservedly for us.

That's love. That's our Creator. And His Fatherly love burns as passionately today, for you and for your loved ones, as it did two thousand years ago. *His love endures forever* (Psalm 136:1, NIV).



But I don't need to. The story isn't ended yet. You are writing for me a new chapter, a new destiny. It will transform my story from a tragedy about me to a love story about You. It will all become Your story, not mine, one that glorifies You, our magnificent, patient, gracious Father.

Though I can't rejoice in who I have been,
I do rejoice in who You are and who You are making me.
My story will still have a wonderful, uplifting ending, one that is happier than I ever dreamed it could be.
