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Behind the Hymn: Give Me Jesus

Over the years, this spiritual has appeared in various collections under a variety of writers' names, and with a wide selection of lyrics in the verses. I had often come across it and was always moved by this simple, heartfelt prayer. A few times I had heard it performed, but I don't ever remember hearing it sung as a congregational hymn.

It was pressed on my mind when my wife and I bought several coffee mugs with the opening words of the spiritual printed on the side: "In the morning when I rise, give me Jesus." As I thought about the spiritual in the following months, I began to wonder if it had not enjoyed broader usage because the lyrics were too repetitious. Each verse had only one phrase of text, sung three times, followed by "Give me Jesus".

In August, 2023, I felt impressed to revise the melody slightly and to give each verse of text three rhyming phrases. I pray simply that these changes help give this hymn the usage it deserves.

Father, all Your blessings, all Your life, love, and holy beauty come to us in Jesus Christ. All day long, whatever comes, now and forever, give me Jesus!

Behind the Hymn: I Cannot Tell

I had long admired William Y. Fullerton's hymn, "I Cannot Tell". As part of my product development duties at Lillenas Publishing Company, I had sought places to use it in publication. But arrangers to whom I presented it would never choose it. Finally one of them told me why: the text had too many archaic phrases and would need a rewrite.

April 12-17, 1996, I did that rewrite, and since then, the hymn has enjoyed broad usage in hymnals and choral publications. Many individuals have singled it out for praise. But I have to make an honest admission: for me, my version does not have the poetic subtlety or depth of insight of William Y. Fullerton's original version.


Yet many find it meaningful because it makes the majestic mysteries of Jesus' life, death, resurrection, and eternal triumph accessible to the minds and hearts of believers.



Behind the Hymn: I Love You, Jesus, Savior, Lord

Edward Caswall (1814-1878) was an Anglican clergyman who converted to Catholicism and became a priest. He wrote a number of hymns that have enjoyed usage over the years, including "My God, I Love Thee". Jane Marshall adapted his text and used it for her classic anthem, "My Eternal King".

But I wanted his sincere expression of love for God to continue to speak its truth to current congregations. So on April 25-29, 1994, I kept Caswall's ideas but completely rewrote his text. The hymn says simply that despite God's boundless wealth and lavish blessings, we don't love Him because of His gifts, nor out of fear of His punishment. We are moved to love Him and are drawn to serve Him because of His boundless love for us so undeniably expressed on the cross.

Father, as Your witnesses, remind us of this truth. People will be drawn to You and bound to You, not by fear of hell nor by promises of heaven, but by Your love. Help us to tell people and show people how much You love them.

Behind the Hymn: It's a Gift

I've always enjoyed the old Shaker hymn:

'Tis the gift to be simple,
'Tis the gift to be free,
'Tis the gift to come down where we ought to be,
And when we find ourselves in the place just right,
'Twill be in the valley of love and delight.

It's so joyful and folksy, in the best sense of the word.

But for years I longed for a text that more fully expressed the simplicity and joy of living in Christ, of walking with Him day by day. Life in Him is so rich and free. All He requires is that we trust Him.

It is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose. (Philippians 2:13, NIV)

I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people. (Jeremiah 31:33, NIV)

I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. And I will put my Spirit in you and move you to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws. (Ezekiel 36:26-27, NIV)

God has chosen to make known...the glorious riches of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. (Colossians 1:27, NIV)

On Sunday morning, June 28, 1998, Pastor Jesse Middendorf was preaching on freedom in Christ. His message inspired me to write this new hymn, based on the old Shaker hymn. It is written to speak both to seekers and to believers. My prayer is that it draws someone to the beauty, the freedom, and the natural simplicity of life in Christ.

Behind the Hymn: Jesus, the Light of the World

Then Jesus again spoke to them, saying, "I am the Light of the world; the one who follows Me will not walk in the darkness, but will have the Light of life." (John 8:12, NASB)

African-American spirituals often enlivened and reinvented the hymns of writers like Isaac Watts, Charles Wesley, and John Newton. After emancipation, some white hymn writers continued that tradition.

George D. Elderkin (1845-1928) was one of those. He took Charles Wesley's "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing" and added refrain lines and a refrain, and gave it a musical setting with the flavor of a gospel waltz.

The popularity of "Jesus, the Light of the World" prompted composer-arranger Tom Fettke to call me on June 16, 1998. He was compiling a choral songbook titled *Magnify the Lord*. Since "Jesus, the Light of the World" had a non-seasonal refrain, he wanted me to give it non-seasonal verses. That request resulted in the hymn below.



Behind the Hymn: My Time Is in Your Hand

I deeply desire that constancy in God.


That's why I was drawn to William Freeman Lloyd's hymn based on this verse, "My Times Are in Thy Hand". Since it is nearly unknown these days, it was long on my list of hymns to rewrite. I was stirred to action by a pair of Sunday School lessons I was preparing to teach on time. Using my teaching notes from the latter of those two lessons, I wrote this hymn text on January 24-27, 2023, to be sung with that lesson.

It is appropriate that the writing of my hymn was inspired by a Sunday School lesson, since William Lloyd had devoted his life to Sunday School work.

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Behind the Hymn: Not I, but Christ

I want to breath this prayer every moment, with every fiber of my being. What greater privilege and pleasure could there be than glorifying Christ with every thought, word, and action! I want to tell and show everyone just how good and great and personally present He is.

The original text was by Ada Anne Whiddington and was first published in 1891. My first response to the hymn was that it needed a better musical setting, so I placed it in the appropriate "to do" file. But when I came across it again on March 15, 2000, I felt that the text was part of the problem and needed a rewrite. I started it that same day and completed it on April 4, 2000, after returning from the Holy Land.

On June 12-14 of that year, I completed my work on this hymn by providing it with a tune. I named the tune BOWERS in honor of Curt Bowers, head of Chaplaincy Ministries at the International Headquarters for the Church of the Nazarene. He had played a key role in reaching chaplains with our line of pocket-size books.

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Behind the Hymn: Nothing Between

The author and composer of "Nothing Between" was Charles Albert Tindley (1851-1933) an eminent African-American Methodist minister. Preacher, pastor, writer, and social activist, he is regarded as the 'father of African-American hymnody'.

During my teen years at Pisgah (now West Chester) Church of the Nazarene, I have a clear memory of "Nothing Between" being sung as a solo by our pastor's daughter, Joy McKinney Wisehart. Her heartfelt performance of this sincere prayer left a lasting impression on me.

But over the years since, I noticed that the song hadn't gotten much usage, especially as a congregational hymn. To me, the tune seemed too repetitious, and parts of the text were awkward to today's ears – though the thoughts were wonderful.

On the evening of August 26, 2008, I dreamed about revising the song. Taking that as a message from God, the next morning I interrupted my work on another hymn and began by revising the music. I revised the text over the next few days, finishing on August 31, 2008.

Our Father God made us for Himself. Let us keep our hearts and lives for Him alone, with nothing distracting, nothing between.

Behind the Hymn: Psalm 44

I was in the God-directed process of writing a hymn based on each of the 150 Psalms. As I approached the next Psalm in order, Psalm 44, I assembled research notes, then went looking for a tune, starting with my folder of spirituals. I soon came to "Steady, Jesus Listenin'". I knew it was the one! I could picture it being sung.

I revised the tune, then wrote a completely new text, keeping only one word of the original text: "Steady". I began work on the hymn on New Year's Eve, 2020, and completed it on January 4.

In tough times, that is God's word to us: "Steady". He is Almighty God, always able, always wise, always lovingly working for our best. Nothing has changed. Just hold steady!

Behind the Hymn: See How God's Flower Blossoms

A shoot will spring from the stem of Jesse, And a Branch from his roots will bear fruit. (Isaiah 11:1, NASB)

I love the warm, down-to-earth, yet mysterious flavor of Isaiah's prophecies of Messiah. What Spirit-inspired pictures he paints! Thus I had long been attracted to the Advent hymn, "Lo How a Rose E'er Blooming", translated from a 16th century German original.

In the mid 1980's I began supplying new words for familiar, well-loved Christmas melodies that lacked accessible Christian texts. I first tackled "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming" in February, 1990, but wasn't able to finish until I came back to it on December 3-6, 1993. That version was titled "The Flower". It was musically much closer to the original and was primarily choral.

I first attempted adapting the music for congregational use in December, 2000, but I was never comfortable with that version and didn't use or distribute it. On August 7, 2008, I woke up having dreamed about "The Flower". That prompted another attempt at adapting the music for congregation, but I wasn't satisfied until August 14, 2008, when I condensed it all the way down to an even 4/4 meter, at which point I retitled it, "See How God's Flower Blossoms".

Jesus Christ -- what a mighty salvation God has brought from such a tiny seed! He is the full flower of the Father's glorious grace!

Behind the Hymn: Soldiers of Christ, Arise

John and Charles Wesley's Methodist movement was highly controversial in its day. Active opposition, even violence was common. Thus a call to put on "The Whole Armor of God" (the poem's original title in 1742) was highly relevant.

The hymn was based on Ephesians 6:10 and following. Thus when I was drawn to write a hymn on the full armor of God, I went back to Charles' hymn. But when I printed off the full text of the hymn from the internet, I found that he didn't deal with the various pieces of armor in any detail. Instead, much of his hymn deals with the Ephesians 6:18ff verses on prayer. That was further than I wanted to go with my hymn. I wanted to focus on the armor.

So I adapted his first four lines, then waited to see what other portions of his hymn might be useful for mine. As it turned out, nothing else was. I finished my hymn on June 9, 2016.

Father, help me to arm and protect myself with the full armor of Jesus Christ: His truth, His righteousness, His gospel, His faith, His salvation, and His Word.



Behind the Hymn: The Blood-washed Pilgrim

I had just finished listening through an unabridged recording of John Bunyan's *The Pilgrim's Progress*. At the same time I had been reading Darius Salter's biography of Francis Asbury. Together, they brought the pilgrim's image to mind:


- traveling light

- resisting temptation and enduring trials


In December, 2003, as I thought about writing a new hymn text on this subject, using a folk tune, I felt drawn to rewrite the old gospel song, *The Blood-washed Pilgrim*. It was obviously based *on The Pilgrim's Progress*, so it seemed a good place to start. The original text had good content but needed lots of rewriting for clarity and relevance. I also adapted the music a bit here and there. The hymn was completed on December 22, 2003.



As December 1997 arrived, I hadn't planned on writing any more Christmas carols that season, having already written several. But I came across an old translation of a native American carol. It intrigued me, and I sensed the Lord drawing me toward it. So I wrote a completely new text, using the same 16th century French melody.






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Behind the Hymn: The Truth of God Is Greater Far

George Rawson (1807-1889), a solicitor (lawyer) from Leeds, England, wrote the hymn text, "We Limit Not the Truth of God". He based it on a 1620 farewell speech John Robinson made to the pilgrims departing on the Mayflower. Here is a portion of that address:

I charge you before God and His blessed angels that you follow me no further than you have seen me follow Christ. If God reveal anything to you by any other instrument of His, be as ready to receive it as you were to receive any truth from my ministry, for I am verily persuaded the Lord hath more truth and light yet to break forth from His Holy Word.

I was moved by the unique importance of Rawson's hymn and saved it among other worthy hymns. It sat in my notebook for decades until 2010. In January I received an email from a relative who disagreed with something I had written and forcefully advocated for universalism. I am always reluctant to engage in theological disagreements, but I felt prompted by God do some scriptural research and send him a candid reply. I did so on February 15. To end my email on a conciliatory note, I quoted Rawson's hymn.

Quoting it there stirred my interest in it, and March 4 I completed my rewrite, "The Truth of God Is Greater Far".

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Behind the Hymn: Your Ceaseless, Unexhausted Love


I am a fervent admirer of the hymns of Charles Wesley. Though we are separated by over two centuries, I consider him my mentor as a hymn writer. He struck a beautiful balance between subjective, emotional appeal and objective, thought-provoking content. I aspire to that combination.

Yet I have rarely felt adequate to attempt to update any of his hymns. With him, language and ideas seemed so interwoven as to be inseparable.

But on November 1, 1991, I made an exception with his hymn, "Thy Ceaseless, Unexhausted Love". I simply couldn't let such a valuable hymn die without some effort to give it more life. In this case I kept as much of the original hymn as I could – perhaps half of it – while updating the language where it seemed necessary.
